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

Worship Matters: The Journey Continues

April 6 is the beginning of **Passiontide**, the last two weeks of our Lenten journey. Our readings and prayers of the liturgy in these weeks will focus on the Passion of Our Lord and will take us through some of the most poignant scenes in Jesus' ministry and last days in Jerusalem. Our Gospel on this Sunday will take us to the time just before Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We find Jesus in Bethany where his friends Mary, Martha, and Lazarus are preparing a special supper for him. In the midst of this meal, Mary, without regard for cost or the customs of the day, expresses her devotion by anointing Jesus with a costly ointment, wiping his feet with her hair. Mary, our teacher for today, acts from her heart, responding to all that Jesus has been in her life. She gives extravagantly, without counting the cost, expressing an understanding about Jesus and what he must do. The anointing foreshadows Jesus' death, just as the raising of Lazarus, foreshadows his resurrection, and we recall the words of the prophet Isaiah from our Old Testament reading: "I am about to do a new thing..."

Join us this month as we remember and retell the sacred story of Christ's passion and resurrection.

• Palm/Passion Sunday April 13, at 10:00 a.m.

We wave palm branches and sing Hosanna as we remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

• Maundy Thursday April 17, at 7:00 p.m.

From the Latin *Mandatum* (command). Jesus gives us a 'new' commandment – to love and serve one another; and we commemorate the Last Supper.

• Good Friday April 18, at 7:00 p.m.

We remember Christ's passion and death and conclude with a time of reverence as we "Behold, the life-giving cross on which was hung the salvation of the whole world."

• Holy Saturday (Easter Vigil) April 19, at 7:00 p.m.

We gather around a new fire and process with candles into the sanctuary to experience in word, song, and symbols, the history of our salvation. We begin in darkness that bursts into Easter light and joy at this our first celebration of the Resurrection – God's victory over sin and death.

Resurrection of Our Lord, Easter April 20 at 10:00 a.m.

Alleluia! Christ is risen. Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia!


And lastly, thank you to Bridges to Christ for their ongoing support of CHUM with so many donations of funds, clothing and supplies. Your help is invaluable.

A reminder that, on account of privacy, hospitals and nursing homes will NOT contact the Church to share that you have been admitted unless you or a family member tell them or the hospital chaplains to do so. Protecting privacy is also a way we care for our friends who may or may not wish for others to know of their illness or condition. If you hear that someone is sick or hospitalized, do not tell others unless you have been given permission by them to do so. If you wish to be visited by the Pastor or placed on the prayer list, contact the Church office. If you have a conversation with someone who is ill. hospitalized, or has come to be in a short or long term care facility, ask them if they want the congregation and Pastor to know what is happening before you pass the word along. Do not assume that because you know, that the individual wants everyone else to, as well. Honoring the privacy of our neighbors, as well as expressing our own desire for the church or pastor to know of our condition, helps to prevent troublesome situations and helps us support one another!

During the fall & winter of 2023-24, a group of CSS students used the Concordia kitchen to complete some of the prep work for meals served 3 or 4 times to the residents at St. Francis House. Upon their graduation, no group has replaced the students in this muchappreciated task.


So churches throughout the city have been asked if they are available to help. The Endowment Committee has generously assigned funds to allow Concordia to take part in preparing some of these meals.

We are currently waiting to confirm with CHUM staff, however, our first suggested date is April 12. We have a simple menu plan. 


THU, APR 17, 6:00 PM | FREE | DULUTH FOLK SCHOOL



Introducing "Duluth 101", a free monthly event series at the Duluth Folk House that will feature presentations about historical, cultural, and natural aspects of our community.

First up: Duluth's climate. Dr. Kenneth "Kenny" Blumenfeld, Senior Climatologist for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, speaks about Duluth's weather history, how Duluth's climate is trending at present and what everyone may expect down the road.



The event starts at Leif Erickson park, where speakers and a rally for environmental protection are held.

The route then continues to Gitchi Ode Akiing, where groups table for how local community members can get active and involved with important environmental and climate advocacy opportunities. The length of the route is about 3/4 of a mile. Parking is available at the rose garden and Endion Station.

Sponsors include local environmental, climate, indigenous and non-profit groups, with a list available later by organizers.
